ADMINISTRATIVE BUSINESS

A. Pension Cost Management (Discussion/Direction) – Pete Carr, City Manager

Mr. Carr provided an overview of information relative to the City's ongoing unfunded accrued liability (UAL) with CalPERS via a slide presentation.

Councilmembers requested Staff investigate bringing in an advisor to further explain the City's options for funding the UAL. Mr. Carr stated he will bring back costs for this service to Council at a future meeting. Mayor Roundy offered to speak with a Willows Councilmember to determine what they are considering for their UAL and report back.

B. Verbal update on Covid-19's impact on the local economy and City operations, (Discussion/Direction) – Pete Carr, City Manager

Mr. Carr reported the virus case rate is declining but Glenn County, needs three weeks of lower case rate and lower test positivity before it can proceed to the next tier. Seventeen new cases occurred over the weekend; there are two in the hospital and 71 active cases. Vaccinations are very limited by supply and the Optum Serve testing site remains open for walk-ins.

Grants to businesses from HCD's CV-1 program are in progress and discussion with County officials on what can be done with the next round, CV-2 and 3, have begun.

SUBJECT: Council Position on SB 9 (Atkins) (Action)

City Council will consider authorizing mayor to endorse a letter on behalf of the City Council to the Legislature about SB 9 (Atkins).

BACKGROUND:

Cal Cities regularly reports to its member cities on issues of importance to cities, and guides city councils in effectively advocating for local control objectives. City staff and Council members may bring particularly important and pertinent topics to the attention of the full City Council for consideration in taking a City of Orland position and authorizing action.

DISCUSSION:

In this case, proposed Senate Bill 9 by Toni Atkins of San Diego would effectively eliminate the City's ability to maintain the integrity of R-1 residential zoning districts. While State law and Orland municipal code already provide allowance for auxiliary dwelling units where appropriate in R-1 zones, SB 9 would require that all residential lots be subject to duplex or even greater intensity development – effectively stripping local control of zoning from planning commissions and municipal councils.

SB 9 (Atkins) Increased Density in Single-Family Zones

OPPOSE UNLESS AMENDED

Background: California is a geographically and demographically diverse state, and that is reflected in its 482 cities and 58 counties. Local elected officials are charged by the California Constitution with protecting their citizens' welfare. One chief way local governments do this is by exercising control over what gets built in their community. Local officials balance the need for additional housing against the concerns and desires of their constituents. Where appropriate, those officials enact ordinances to shape their communities based on local conditions and desires. Moreover, these planning actions and decisions take place within the confines of state laws that require local governments to plan and zone for new housing, subject to certification by the California Housing and Community Development Department (HCD), and under threat of fines for improper denial as a result of recent legislation.

What Does SB 9 Specifically Do?

- Requires a local government to ministerially approve a housing development containing two residential units in single-family residential zones.
- Requires a local government to allow a developer to convert an existing single-family home into a duplex and then add an accessory dwelling unit (ADU) and a junior accessory dwelling unit (JADU) to the same parcel.
- Requires a local government to ministerially approve a single-family lot split, creating two lots, and allowing the construction of one single-family home, one ADU, and one JADU on each lot for a total of six units on a parcel originally zoned for one single-family home.

Cal Cities is Seeking the Following Amendments to SB 9:

- Clarify that a property owner using SB 9 is limited to constructing two residential units, not two residential units and additional accessory dwelling units (ADUs) on the same parcel;
- Require a housing developer to acquire a building permit within one year of a lot split, so that speculators do not sell lots and never build homes;
- Allow local governments to require adequate access for police, fire and other public safety vehicles and equipment;
- Prohibit developers from using SB 9 in very high fire hazard severity zones;
- · Allow cities to determine a range of lot sizes suitable for SB 9 development projects;
- Ensure HCD provides Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) credit for production of SB 9 units;
- Allow local governments to take into account local conditions such as hillsides, lot dimensions, natural hazards, available infrastructure, etc. when approving or denying housing project applications;
- · Allow local governments to continue to determine parking standards; and
- Ensure large-scale investors and builders do not exploit SB 9 provisions.

ACTION:

<u>SB 9 will be heard by the Senate Committee on Housing in the coming weeks.</u> At this time, the bill has not been set for a hearing date, however, the committee's first hearing is scheduled for March 18. Please send in letters as soon as possible. A sample letter is attached.

Dear Senator Nielsen:

On behalf of the City Council of Orland, we request your Nay vote on SB 9 (Atkins) *Increased Density in Single-Family Zones*.

SB 9 is an unnecessary and counterproductive curtailment of local control of residential zoning.

- There is already ample multiple-family residential zoning per the City's Housing Element and established RHNA more than the market is willing to build.
- It is not the City's R-1 zoning that is constraining construction of affordable housing, rather the price of land and the cost of both infrastructure and building products. SB 9 would do nothing to address these constraints.

SB 9 emanates from a legislator in San Diego (Senator Toni Atkins) who has a sole vision of producing more housing. This well-intentioned but misguided bill comes at the expense (literally) of local governments. This is an urban-centric piece of legislation that might work in her District but doesn't in our rural Northern California city. SB 9 would effectively "quash" R-1 zoning and make it equal to an R-2 zone district (think single-family residences vs. duplexes and triplexes), thus significantly altering the character and function of a "traditional" rural-community single-family neighborhood.

There is a need for both single family and multi-family housing. Orland welcomes increased density by construction of duplexes and other multi-family formats in properly zoned areas – most of which have been selected and so designated because of their advantageous proximity to transit and shopping. SB 9 would hurt, not help, this objective. State funding programs are already in place to incentive and subsidize density development.

SUBJECT: Unpermitted Work Fee Ordinance Adoption (Public Hearing/Action)

Noticed public Hearing for second reading and adoption of proposed ordinance to update the City's fee for permit-required work being performed without a permit.

BACKGROUND

As discussed at the January 4th, January 19th and February 1st, permit fees are designed to offset the jurisdiction's cost of performing inspections of permitted work, ensuring the work is performed according to approved plans and building codes. The State Building Code – which Orland has adopted as its own – prohibits certain types of work from being performed with a building permit and authorizes a fee for commencement of work prior to issuance of a permit. The City of Orland has for two decades levied a \$47.00 fee when this condition is observed and adds this amount to the fee for the building permit.

\$47.00 is not an effective incentive to apply for a permit as required. The process of identifying the condition, notifying the property owner and issuing a Stop Work Order, then processing the fee and lifting the Order is probably costing the City more than \$47.00 in labor & materials. Our most common permit issued currently is rooftop solar, with valuation-based permit fees typically about \$250-450. Water heater permits are about \$91. Working without a permit occurs about 18 times a year.

Other jurisdictions commonly charge double the original fee; that is, what the original fee would have been + 100%, so the permit applicant pays a total of twice what he would have had had he properly applied for a permit in the first place.

DISCUSSION

Council considered economic issues of scale, relevance and timing. Council directed staff to return with an actionable ordinance to update the fee using commonly accepted practices as a basis. The revised proposed ordinance doubles the permit fee, with no minimum, and establishes an effective date of July 1, 2021. Until June 30 the current \$47 fee would apply.

For a typical project started without a permit the calculation would be:

	Building Permit	Stop-work Fee	<u>Total</u>
Rooftop solar	\$275	\$275	\$ 550
Re-roof	\$700	\$700	\$1400
Water heater	\$ 91	\$91	\$ 182

The additional fee would apply equally to building, plumbing and electrical permits. It would not apply to plan check services.

CITY OF ORLAND CITY COUNCIL ORDINANCE NO. 2021-02

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ORLAND ADDING SECTION 15.04.030 TO THE ORLAND MUNICIPAL CODE REGARDING ADDITIONAL FEE FOR WORK DONE WITHOUT A BUILDING PERMIT

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that compliance with the building permit process is necessary and proper for the safe and sound construction and completion of building improvements in the City, as it provides for review and approval of the work prior to completion; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that the imposition of an additional fee equal to at least the amount of the permit fee where an improvement is undertaken without the necessary building permit will both encourage compliance with the building permit process and offset the additional cost to the City to review work undertaken without the required permit; and, further, will not penalize those who seek to and do comply with the building code application process. This is a charge equal to that imposed by similarly situated local entities.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ORLAND DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The above-listed findings and statements of intent are true and correct.

Section 2. Section 15.04.030 of the Orland Municipal Code is added as follows:

15.04.030 Work Without Permit-Additional Fee for Work Done Without Permit

Where work for which a permit is required is commenced prior to the obtaining of the required permit(s), the Building Official or his/her designated representative shall charge two times (double) all applicable permit (inspection) fees related to the required permit(s), including, but not limited to, building permits, sign permits and demolition permits. The payment of the increased fee(s) shall not relieve any person from fully complying with the requirements of this code, other codes adopted by the city, or the requirements of the Planning and Development Code. Failure to comply with the provisions of this chapter may also subject the violator to any other penalties, sanctions or remedies provided elsewhere in this code or by law.

Section 3. Severability.

If any section, subsection, phrase or clause of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed this and each section, subsection, phrase or clause thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, phrase or clauses be declared unconstitutional on their face or as applied. **Section 4.** This Ordinance shall take effect July 1, 2021 after passage and approval by the City Council.

Section 5. The City Clerk is directed to publish or post this Ordinance within 15 days following adoption indicating votes cast.

SUBJECT: Skatepark - Discussion

The City Council and staff will discuss the potential for a skatepark facility in Orland.

BACKGROUND

The Recreation Commission last discussed a skatepark in 2012. At the time staff surveyed best practices in the region and reached out to obtain two estimates for an above ground skatepark like Gridley has ranging from \$150,000 to \$263,000 (not including a price for a concrete pad.) A concrete skate park like Corning and Willows have is expected to be in the \$400,000 - \$600,000 range. Discussion included recognition that location is critical to skatepark safety/security concerns.

DISCUSSION

In 2012 the Recreation Commission discussed the idea of constructing a skatepark in Orland. The Recreation Commission elected to prioritize other projects they thought would benefit Orland better. The Recreation Commission discussed the idea and realized that nearby towns (Corning, Chico, and Willows) have skateparks already and the Commission wanted to provide Orland with something those towns did not have. The Recreation Commission elected to prioritize upgrades at City Pool, building a splash pad, and upgrading the playgrounds at Lely Park and Lollipop Land.

In April 2016 the Recreation Commission prioritized a new capital improvement list including the following: two covered picnic areas at Lely Park, upgrading the outdoor basketball courts, storage container for recreation equipment, and a pump track. Currently the Commission is waiting to see if the City is awarded funds from the Prop 68 grants for which we are seeking to fund the recreation center expansion, add an additional lighted ball field, a new playground at Newport Avenue and a replacement playground at Vinsonhaler Park. We are also planning per capita parks grants funding for completion of a recreation trail. Those awards will be announced in late Summer early Fall and pending the outcome of those awards they will finalize a new parks capital improvement list.

Recently there has been no discussion on a skatepark as the Recreation Commission has prioritized other projects they believe are higher priority for the community. However, staff would be happy to take the idea back to the Recreation Commission if City council would like.


